In Harmony and Tuning In at Everton

In Harmony Liverpool is inspired by Venezuela's El Sistema and uses orchestral music-making to improve the health, education and aspirations of children and young people in Everton. The In Harmony team work with children at Everton Nursery School exploring musicianship from age 2. The In Harmony team is made up of musicians from The Royal Liverpool Philharmonic orchestra.





In March 2024 In Harmony celebrated 15 years in North Liverpool. Since 2009, the programme has benefited over 4,000 children and families in Everton and Anfield and over 300 professional musicians, artists, school teachers and staff.

The curriculum develops musicianship in eight key areas:

Pitch – through voice work and singing.

Pulse – through the beat.

Rhythm – through the rhythm of the words. Concept Pairs – use of high/low, loud/quiet, fast/slow and long/short.

Instrument Preparation – developing the coordination needed for string playing through posture, arm movements, whole body movements, finger and thumb dexterity.

Ensemble – through team work.

Tracking/Reading – through the development of the skills to read music notation.

Creativity/ Expression - Listening to and enjoying music





At Everton Nursery School, children in Heyworth, Cresswell and Spencer 3 also access weekly Tuning In sessions led by the In Harmony musicians. During these sessions, musicians are encouraged to follow children's lead and allow children the freedom of expressing their thoughts and interests through instrument playing.

The instruments available for exploration are a wide variety and include egg shakers, hand bells, desk bells, glockenspiels, drums, tambourines and rainmakers. Staff monitor children's levels of engagement and well-being during Tuning In sessions to ensure a positive impact on children's learning and development.

Island time

In Heyworth class children's personal, social and emotional development, communication, language and problem-solving skills are enhanced through the interpretation of Elinor Goldschmied's theories on heuristic play and 'islands of intimacy'.

At Everton Nursery School this is referred to as 'Island Time'. We have found that this way of working



deepens children's learning and improves their well-being. The improvement in children's problem solving and communication and language skills is confirmed by nursery school colleagues following transition to the on-site nursery.



What makes 'Island time' different is that it is focused interaction specifically organised to respond to two-year-olds' need for close relationships with their family worker. Island time starts on the 'island' - a special rug only used during this session - and is characterised by a flow of meaningful, directed praise about what children are doing, saying and sharing.

The focus and intention of each Island Time Is different for each child. The aim is to ignite children's curiosity and promote awe and wonder exploring interesting items together.





The planned activities increase children's attention, concentration and sustained investigation. Staff have also discovered that this correlates with increased levels of happiness and well-being in the children. The children access Island time sessions when they are fully settled in Heyworth class and when the feel safe enough to move around the classroom. During this half term children have so far explored:

- Puppets relating to the tale of the half term 'Jack and the Beanstalk'.
- Click Clack track a toy that promotes turn taking
- A pumpkin exploring what a pumpkin feels like and new seasonal experiences.
- Bubbles promoting joy, wonder and fun!



Island time sessions are shared on children's learning journals and will detail what children have learned and key vocabulary. Please continue to like and comment on your child's learning journey. We look forward to more Island Time sessions next term.

Investigating the changes of the season

The children in Spencer 2

have been investigating the changes of the season and enjoying a wide range of autumn-themed learning experiences both indoors and outdoors.

We began by going on Autumn walks around our outdoor environment, using checklists to spot and identify seasonal materials such as colourful leaves, acorns, conkers, and sycamore seeds. Our educational visit to Everton park was another wonderful opportunity to explore nature, where we discovered many different types of leaves and even found some prickly horse chestnut cases.



The children noticed that the apple trees in our outdoor area were full of fruit. We carefully collected the apples and used them to bake apple crumble. We also had the opportunity to take part in pressing apples to make our very own fresh apple juice.

During forest school, the children have been creative with natural materials, making leaf crowns and necklaces. In Expressive Arts, they have enjoyed leaf printing and collage making, experimenting with textures and colours to create stunning autumn artwork.

Our story times have also been filled with autumn related stories.

The children have listened to and discussed books such as Leaf Man, We're Going on a Leaf Hunt, The Tiny Acorn, Fletcher and the Fallen Leaves, and We're Going on a Pumpkin Hunt. These stories have inspired lots of imaginative play and conversation about the changing world around us.

We have also been busy harvesting crops from our school garden



including cucumbers, tomatoes, sweet corn and pumpkins. Pumpkin picking in our very own pumpkin patch was a real highlight for the children, and we are all looking forward to using our harvest to make some home pumpkin soup soon!

It has been a wonderful term so far, full of exploration, creativity, and hands-on learning. The children have shown great curiosity and teamwork as they've discovered all that makes Autumn such a special season.

Early mathematics



The children in Spencer have explored early mathematics through a focused investigation of the number one, inspired by 'The Dot' by Peter H. Reynolds. The story's central message - that even a small mark can be the beginning of something meaningful - provided a creative and accessible entry point into deeper number learning.

Children engaged in a "dot hunt" around the environment, identifying dots in everyday objects and contexts. This observational activity encouraged spatial awareness, pattern recognition, and the idea that one object can hold meaning on its own or as part of a whole.

To reinforce the concept of one as a single unit, the children took part in a hands-on M&M experiment where hot water was poured over the m and, m's. Children were able to make predictions and estimations of what was going to happen which helped support mathematical thinking. Each sweet was counted individually, helping children internalise the principle of one-to-one correspondence and make tangible connections between quantity and number.

The learning continued through dot-inspired artwork, where children created their own designs starting with a single mark. As they explored colour, size, and pattern, they naturally used mathematical language and demonstrated early understanding of scale, shape, and composition.



This approach reflects a key principle in early mathematics: that deep understanding is more valuable than rapid counting.

There is a common misconception that young children must quickly count to 10 to demonstrate progress. However, genuine mathematical thinking develops when children are supported to explore number concepts

in context - understanding what numbers represent and how they relate to the world around them.

By avoiding a focus on right and wrong answers, educators encouraged open exploration, risktaking, and critical thinking. In this supportive environment, children remained confident and engaged, building strong foundations for future mathematical learning.

Through creative experiences and meaningful exploration, the children discovered that understanding a single number - deeply and in many forms - is a powerful step in becoming confident, capable mathematicians.

ATTENDANCE AT NURSERY SCHOOL

School Matters!



The importance of **Excellent School Attendance** for your child cannot be stressed enough. While it is inevitable that children will nearly all be absent at some time due to sickness, persistent absence will severely disrupt their education. Persistently absent children are those who have more than 10% absences. This amount of absence from school has a significantly detrimental impact on their learning and development. We will be continuing to monitor children who are persistently absent from School throughout the academic year.

Why is excellent school attendance important?

Excellent attendance gives children the opportunity to achieve to their full potential giving them a better chance in life. When children attend school every day they achieve more, learn better, settle in quicker and make positive friendships. There is a clear link between poor attendance at school and lower academic achievement.

The more time a child misses in school the more gaps they will have in their learning, which can be hard to catch up with. Also children find it difficult to settle back into a routine after a period of absence and this can impact upon their friendships and well-being.

Policy and Procedure

As requested by the Local Authority, all children's attendance is carefully monitored, and shared with the Local Authority.

Parents are **expected to inform the school via the school Arbor App**, on the morning of each day a child is absent from school, this is part of a nationwide safeguarding protocol so that every child can be accounted for. Please continue to let us know through using our school Arbor App when this is the case for your child, so that we can **authorise** your child's absence from school. Failure to inform us of your child's absence from school will result in an **unauthorised absence mark**. We will also need to undertake a **welfare check home visit** if your child is absent without informing school of this.

If your child has poor attendance, support will be given to improve their attendance through the Headteacher and School staff team. If poor attendance continues then your child's nursery place will be reviewed.

PLODs at Everton Nursery

In Cresswell and Spencer classes, children will spend time in a smaller group for Family Worker Time. During this time they will engage in activities with their Family Worker around one of the children's interests in the form of a PLOD (Possible Line of Direction). Each week a different PLOD interest will be used to plan Family Worker time activities.









Cresswell children focus on the Prime Areas of Learning:

- Personal Social and Emotional Development
- Communication and Language
- Physical Development

Spencer Classes focus on all 7 areas of learning which include the above Prime Areas and the 4 Specific Areas of Learning:

- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design



Activities related to the child's PLOD focus will be chosen together with the child, asking them for ideas on how they can explore their interest. The PLOD interest will then be continued through continuous provision both indoors and outdoors. Family Workers will also plan in sessions where children can share what they have created so far and talk about what they have liked.

Once your child's Family Worker has completed the intended learning through the PLOD, they will then post a story on Learning Journals with photographs explaining



the activities they have engaged in and any new skills and vocabulary they have used. When they are posted, please take the time to read about your child's PLOD when it has been



written and make a comment! You can also post any home learning that your child has done relating to their interest for



them to share with their Family Worker.
This half term in Cresswell we have explored PLODs with the themes of Spiders, Under the Sea and Climbing. Children have shown excitement when engaging in activities related to these topics and when sharing them with their friends!
