

ECO Schools

Have you ever noticed the Green Flag flying high above the school? This represents Everton Nursery Schools commitment to Environmental Education.

Eco-Schools is operated globally and was launched in 1994 in response to the 1992 UN Rio Earth Summit.

Environmental charity <u>Keep Britain Tidy</u> is the Eco-Schools National Operator for England, where more than 18,000 schools are registered and 1,200 schools currently hold the internationally recognised Eco-Schools Green Flag.



Here at Everton we currently hold The Eco Schools prestigious 'Ambassador' status which was awarded in 2019. This award recognises the impact our Eco Curriculum has upon the education of young children.

The award acknowledges our commitment to providing essential learning experiences that shape children's values, perspectives and understanding of the world around them.

The programme we embed teaches children about ten topics; bio diversity, energy, litter, global citizenship, healthy living, school grounds, transport, waste, water and marine.

Bird watching week, switch off fortnight, the Duckling and Chick hatching project...these are just a few examples of how we support children to understand how they can help the environment.


Spring Events

During the week of 4th April 2022, Everton Nursery School and Family Centre hosted a Spring event for parents, carers and families in our main school hall. Each class hosted on a different day to ensure their event was tailored to and specific for individual classes. These events were an opportunity for parents and carers to come into our setting and see their own children in their nursery environment. Creative and fun activities were provided for children and families to engage in together such as planting a sunflower, creating an Easter card and various exciting Easter crafts. There was also an opportunity for parents and carers to read their child's Family Worker file and speak to their child's Family Worker and/or their class teacher about their child's progress and development. Children were also keen to give their parents and carers a guided tour of their classroom, which all children and staff take great pride in. This



allowed parents and carers to see children's Family Worker boards, including PLOD's, and gain a deeper insight into understanding what their child's learning environment looks likes.

As an added bonus, our children were also able to introduce their families to our 6 chicks that hatched with us in March 2022. The chick eggs were provided by a company called 'Eggucation', which is a family run business. With over 20 years' experience delivering Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics





allowed our children to observe the hatching process of chicks and observe how chicks grow and develop over a short period of time, which children were then able to share with their parents, carers and families.

Each of the classes Spring events had a great turnout of parents, carers and families and many positive comments about their own children and also about Everton Nursery School were received from the parents, carers and families who attended these Spring events. Developing our School grounds

Back in February we had the opportunity to work with Steve Fuller and Simone Siegan from Willowpool designs to create a variety of willow structures for our school grounds. The children participated in workshops and learned how to make birds and animals, such as fish, pheasants and butterflies from soaked willow rods. Simone taught children how to make crowns and star shaped wands while Steve welcomed children's support as they worked collaboratively to create a wishing tree for our indoor learning environment.





Many parents were introduced to this new sculpture during our Spring event and lots of parents hung personal wishes for their child on the branches.

This is now displayed on our main corridor as an extension to our Eco display.

The main purpose of Steve and Simone's visit was to help us create a natural arch and boarder for our forest school entrance. This is a wonderful addition to our school grounds as it adds to the excitement of visiting our forest school area and acts as a natural barrier to divide our outdoor learning spaces.

This term the children will have the opportunity to work alongside our site management team to develop a pond area within the new outdoor space at the front of our school building.



As part of the planning process, a group of children had the opportunity to visit Everton Park Nature Garden to explore the pond area and to gather ideas

Five Little Ducks

Five Little Ducks

The arrival of the duckling eggs from the company 'Incredible Eggs' had a key influence on children's learning at Everton Nursery School during March and April 2022. 'Incredible Eggs' has 7 branches across England and Scotland and are run from 4 small farms, which are based in the countryside of Cornwall, Kent, Norfolk and County Durham. Each farm is family run with many years of small-scale poultry keeping/breeding experience.

This learning process of observing the beginning of a duckling's life cycle consisted of a sequence of events for children and adults to observe and become involved in.

Embryo eggs were provided, 2-3 days from hatching, giving children and adults the opportunity to observe this hatching process. The incubator provided was calibrated to maintain a constant temperature of 37.5 Degrees Celsius. A brooder plate was also supplied for once the ducklings hatched. In order for the supplied brooder plate to be effective it was advised that the ducklings must be able to touch the bottom of the heat plate to stay warm. The ducklings required clean water and food each day to support their growth and development. Many children undertook the responsibility of this task each morning. This process allowed children and adults easy and safe observation and access to the ducklings during this cycle.

As predicted, after 3 days of the eggs arriving at Everton Nursery School they began to hatch. Six eggs were provided and five healthy ducklings hatched successfully. During the following week, the children observed the ducklings adapting to their environment effectively, both walking inside the brooder cage and swimming in water.

Our children have been very fortunate to observe this life cycle, allowing them to develop their knowledge and understanding of the world around them accordingly. We are already very excited for next year's arrival of the ducklings!

Spring Independence

In Everton Nursery we provide children with the tools and practice they need to become independent with their self-care. Children require fine motor skills,



coordination, balance and gross motor skills to become independent dressers. Young children want to be independent, especially with dressing and undressing, but they need time and practice to get it right.

We provide plenty of real opportunities for children to practice dressing themselves with outdoor wear, helmets for construction role play areas, aprons for cooking and for messy play, and plenty of dressing up for role-play clothes and material. This is paired with plenty of time, patience, minimal assistance and waiting for the children to ask or indicate

they want help to support their independence.

We recommend that parents and carers work together with children to practice



dressing until they are able to do it independently, for example, help your child put a t-shirt over their heads, put their arms through and allow them to complete the last step independently of pulling the t-shirt down. Practice this process and advance by encouraging the child to do more steps independently.

Gross motor activities that focus on postural control, eye hand coordination and balance skills are beneficial when it comes to teaching dressing skills.

Here are some suggested activities:


- Play games where you child has to reach overhead such as blowing bubbles and encouraging your child to reach up to pop them.
- Bat a balloon up into the air without letting it touch the ground.
- Squatting while playing with toys to exercise balance.
- Body awareness: playing games such as 'Simon Says'. E.g. 'Simon says squat and touch the floor', 'Simon says sit down and touch your toes'.

Top Tips to encourage independent dressing

Challenge your children to find as many different ways as possible to put on their coat, for example hood on first, right arm in first, lay the coat on the floor upside down and slide both arms in first. Encourage your child to talk and think about which way they find the easiest and you may want to do this with other pieces of clothing too.



 Sing or make up songs about dressing such as 'This is the way we put on our socks, put on our socks, put on our socks, this is the way we put on our socks on a Tuesday morning' with everyone miming the action together. Challenge children to be a song leader and mime the action without the word, can everyone guess what they are putting on or taking off.





•Choose simple clothing. Try to avoid complex clothes such as buttons and zips to start with as your child may not yet have the fine motor skills needed to navigate these. Elasticated waists and Velcro shoes are great options while you're building your child's confidence and skills.

Woodwork

Woodwork engages hands, minds and hearts. Here at Everton Nursery School Woodwork is part of the enhanced timetable for children in 3-5's. The investigation room is a space for children to think creatively and develop problem solving skills.

Woodwork enables children to exercise skills such as making their own choices and learning through trial and error, it sparks creative thinking and imagination. Woodwork encompasses all aspects of learning and development, supporting maths, scientific investigation, physical coordination, language, and vocabulary.

Children in Spencer class access the investigation room weekly in a small group experience. Initially, children are taught how to use the tools safely and given opportunity to try techniques in appropriate ways. The children now demonstrate mastery, delight and pride in their achievements.

Learning in woodwork progresses at each child's individual pace. Once they have mastered the basic skills, children move into open-ended exploration, making unique creations. Spencer class children have produced many creations including a model of

'Big Ben' and more recently a slide for the visiting Chicks.

As a teacher I believe there is something really special about woodwork. I observe the children feeling empowered and valued by being trusted and given responsibility to work with real tools. The smell and feel of wood, using real tools, the sound of hammering and sawing, hands and minds working together. I look forward to the summer term in which children will take their woodwork skills outdoors and utilise the outdoor woodwork benches in Forest School.


Exploring Topics
